On Thursday 26th April, GEM members joined family, friends, former colleagues, mentors and mentees of Azeezat at Queen Mary University to commemorate the brilliance and impact of her scholarship and reflect on her life and how her legacy lives on. We remembered not only her work and its significant impact academically and beyond, but also the many lives she touched and changed, and the ongoing transformations for which she is responsible.

As those in attendance shared their experiences of knowing Azeezat, a clear thread emerged - of her excellence and incredible knowledge, and also her kindness, generosity and care for others, qualities that inevitably shaped the way that she worked and moved through the world.

After an afternoon of sharing and focus that centred Azeezat's academic scholarship and connections, with a loving tone throughout, GEM led a session of reflection, free-writing and further sharing, based on some of <u>Azeezat's more personal writing</u>. In a perfect embodiment of memorial, everyone in the space took part with the same kindness, generosity and care that Azeezat personified for us. Alongside tears, sadness and ongoing grief, there was also laughter, joyful memories and inspiration, and the beauty of coming together with such vulnerability to hold space that allowed for all these things and more. Azeezat's mum reflected "Dare we believe, things can get better", and despite the loss we continue to feel, it felt reasonable, even fitting, that we do dare to believe things really can get better.

Resources - country primers

Early in the event that has become the current genocide on Palestine, GEM pulled together <u>an extensive resource on Palestine</u>, in response to voices we heard who felt they did not know enough about Palestine to speak up or take action.

We recognise the resource may actually be too much to take in for various reasons, but especially for those looking for something more introductory, concise or manageable.

We also recognise that there are so many more genocides and ongoing atrocities that we could and should raise awareness on, and as such are currently pulling together resources from various sources that we hope will be of use. So much is already out there – our hope is just to present brief primers compiling available information in an accessible manner.

Things that have struck us

The Digital Sisterhood is "a platform that aims to unite women of color [sic] and counter the pre-existing narrative on what it means to be a Muslim woman". Their podcast shares personal stories and believes "[s]torytelling has the power to not only create connections but provide universal truths about ourselves and the world."



The current series of the podcast includes episodes which provide an insight into:

- Palestine If I Must Die
- Sudan Sudan's Collective Grief is Never Ending
- <u>Uyghur Muslims</u> Dada, I Won't Forget Who We Are



Captain Support (UK) is "a grassroots organisation which works in solidarity with all people criminalised for crossing borders or facilitating freedom of movement. The collective provides practical solidarity to people in prison and post-release as well as campaigning for systemic change against criminalisation of migration in the UK, alongside Captain Support International."

They have an upcoming fundraising event on Sunday 19th May in Bethnal Green, with SOAS Detainee support and others, a discussion on "our collective fight against borders, policing, and genocide" – <u>tickets available at this link</u>.



GEM Members' updates

Nejma Collective

Nejma Collective is "a UK-based collective of Muslim volunteers working in solidarity with people in prison by sharing resources and mutual support, motivated by Islamic justice."

Over the past few months, they <u>raised over £10,000</u> to provide Muslims in prison with "money to buy food, clothing and phone credit to speak to their loved ones"; hosted an in-person event on <u>policing in Palestine</u>; and an online event which focused on the experiences of Palestinian men and boys in the Israeli prison system (live tweet threads <u>here</u> and <u>here</u>).

Nejma are <u>currently raising funds for three Palestinian organisations</u> that provide support and defend the rights of Palestinians in prison - <u>support them here</u>.

<u>Statement from ASRA Club – a call out to community on safe spaces and the erasure of</u> Black Muslim women

ASRA Club, founded by GEM member Sahra-Isha, is "a community space centring Muslim women in sports, wellness and sisterhood". Earlier this year, they made a statement calling out Islamophobia, mysogynoir, sexist and anti-Black abuses members have been subjected to and the changes needed at a community level to address these.
