Things that have struck us

People's Tribunal on Police Killings

The **first session** of the **People's Tribunal on Police Killings in the UK took** place on April 6th and 7th. An initiative of the <u>United Families & Friends Campaign</u> (UFFC), <u>Migrant Media</u> and <u>4WardEverUK</u>, the work is also supported by <u>Black Lives</u> <u>Matter UK</u>.

The Tribunal is **concerned with** the **impunity** with which **police and other state killings** continue in the UK, and determined to **radically challenge** this **status quo**. It has been "established to unify the struggles taking place, create a platform for justice and take direct action".

Testimonies from families and loved ones of those killed by the state included those of **Marcia Rigg**, **Ajibola Lewis** and **Myrna Simpson**.

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<u>We Bear Witness - Nejma Collective report</u>

The **Nejma Collective**, founded in 2022, is "a **volunteer group of Muslims working in solidarity with people in prison**...motivated by Islam's holistic approach to justice, that contextualises harm rather than defining people solely by their actions. This approach also seeks accountability and reparation rather than simply caging people and making them more vulnerable."

At the **end of 2024**, they released their **first report** which reflects on the work they have been doing with Muslims in prison since their inception. "This report is **a testament** to those who continue to **struggle**, **learn and fight the horrors of the carceral world-order** of colonialism and capitalism."

Soundtrack To A Coup D'Etat - Film screening with panel discussion

On Sunday 27 April, ActOne Cinema will be holding a screening of Soundtrack to a Coup d'Etat, with proceeds supporting ongoing efforts in the DRC.

Johan Grimonprez's documentary follows Congo's declaration of independence and the country's **post-colonial era**, fusing this with a "soundtrack of bebop, rumba, and jazz" which was itself an element of the CIA's role in the **assassinaton of Patrice Lumumba**.

The screening will be **followed by a panel discussion by Congalese Action Youth Platform** (CAYP), touching on critical issues like genocide, imperialism, extractive capitalism, ecocide, and femicide.

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<u>In Search of Common Ground - Stuart Hall Foundation 10th</u> <u>Anniversary Programme</u>


This year marks the **10th anniversary of the Stuart Hall Foundation**, and we are looking forward to the **series of discussions they will be offering** over the summer, with the **theme** titled *In Search of Common Ground*. The programme **starts** in **May** with the 8th Annual Stuart Hall Public Conversation, featuring a **keynote by Prof. Françoise Vergès**.

"In Vergés' keynote, '*There Will Be No Future Without Seizing the Present*', she will consider **how we might think across difference to construct a life-affirming politics in times of poly-crisis**, with a presentation organised around possibilities for reappropriating the present".

We are **excited** for this **programme's focus on Stuart Hall's ideas around identity** which "dare[s] us to build a collective politics that is flexible enough to hold – even if momentarily – the sum of our individual concerns."
